
More Excerpts:

While pursuing a career as an entrepreneur and consultant, Ed raised a number of dogs from puppyhood. He spent time carefully analyzing the different ways they learned. Watch out! As you teach your dog using these techniques, your dog will not stop with your lessons. I promise it will carefully listen and learn new words on its own.


